### **SUBMISSION GUIDELINES Global Journal for Progressive Innovation and Research (GJPIR)**

The Global Journal for Progressive Innovation and Research (GJPIR) invites high-quality scholarly contributions that provide original insights, rigorous analysis and meaningful academic or practical implications within the scope of its parent and subdivision journals. Authors are requested to read and follow these Submission Guidelines carefully before preparing and submitting their manuscripts. These guidelines are aligned with widely accepted standards followed by leading international academic publishers and are designed to ensure that manuscripts are processed efficiently and evaluated fairly.

All manuscripts submitted to GJPIR must be original. They must not have been published previously in any form, either in print or online, and must not be under consideration for publication elsewhere at the time of submission. The responsibility for the originality and authenticity of the work rests entirely with the authors. Any form of plagiarism, including self-plagiarism, excessive similarity, unattributed use of others' work or data fabrication, is considered a serious ethical violation and may result in immediate rejection of the manuscript and possible restriction on future submissions to the Journal.

Manuscripts should be written in clear and grammatically correct English. Authors should ensure that their work is presented in a coherent, concise and academically sound manner. The Journal accepts a variety of manuscript types including original research articles, review papers, conceptual papers, case studies, short communications and book reviews, provided they fall within the thematic scope of GJPIR and its subdivision journals. Research contributions must demonstrate originality, methodological rigor and relevance to contemporary debates in management, social sciences, economics, engineering, technology, applied sciences and related interdisciplinary fields.

All manuscripts must be submitted in Microsoft Word format (.doc or .docx). Authors should use Times New Roman font, with a font size of 12 points for the main text, 14 points for the title, and 10 points where necessary for tables and figure captions. The manuscript should be typed with one-and-a-half line spacing and margins of one inch (2.54 cm) on all sides. Text should be fully justified. Pages must be numbered consecutively. Tables should be created using the table functions in Word and must be editable; tables inserted as images are not acceptable. Figures, charts and other graphical elements should be of high resolution (a minimum of 300 dpi) and clearly readable. Each table and figure should be appropriately titled and numbered in the order of appearance in the manuscript.

The manuscript should follow a standard and widely accepted structure. It should begin with a clear and informative title that accurately reflects the content of the article. This should be followed by an abstract of approximately 150 to 250 words summarising the purpose of the study, the methodology employed, the key findings and the main implications. Immediately after the abstract, authors should provide four to six keywords that capture the essential themes of the paper and can assist in indexing and searchability.

The main text of the manuscript generally starts with an introduction that provides the background to the study, articulates the research problem, identifies the gap in existing literature and states the objectives and contributions of the research. The introduction should be followed by a comprehensive and up-to-date review of relevant literature, demonstrating the author's familiarity with major theoretical and empirical works in the area and logically leading to the research questions or hypotheses.

The methodology section should describe, in sufficient detail, the research design, data sources, sampling procedures, measurement instruments, analytical tools, models and techniques used in the study. This section should be transparent enough to permit replication of the study by other researchers. For empirical and experimental studies, ethical considerations and approvals, where applicable, should be clearly mentioned. For qualitative, conceptual or case-based work, authors should clearly explain their approach, data sources and analytical framework.

The results section should present the findings of the study in a clear and logically organised manner. Where appropriate, results may be supported with tables, charts and figures. Authors should avoid duplication of information in the text and tables and should ensure that all statistical and analytical outputs are correctly reported and interpreted. The discussion section should interpret the findings in the context of existing literature, highlight theoretical, managerial or policy implications and explain how the results contribute to knowledge and practice.

The manuscript should conclude with a conclusion section that succinctly summarises the major findings of the study, reiterates its contributions, acknowledges key limitations and suggests directions for future research. Authors are encouraged to be realistic and transparent about the limitations of their work and to propose meaningful and feasible avenues for further inquiry.

All sources cited in the manuscript must be listed in the references section at the end of the document. GJPIR follows the APA 7th edition referencing style for submissions in management, social sciences and related fields, and the IEEE referencing style for submissions in engineering, computer science and technology-related domains. Authors must ensure that every in-text citation has a corresponding entry in the reference list and that references are accurate and complete. As a general guideline, authors are encouraged to include a substantial proportion of recent references from the last ten years, while also acknowledging foundational or classical works where relevant.

To facilitate the Journal's double-blind peer review process, authors are required to prepare two separate files at the time of submission. The first is the title page, which should contain the full title of the article, the names of all authors, their institutional affiliations, ORCID IDs where available, the full contact details of the corresponding author, acknowledgements of financial or institutional support, declarations of any potential conflicts of interest and a brief statement of the specific contributions of each author to the work. The second file is the main manuscript, which must not contain any information that can identify the authors, their institutions or their funding sources.

The Global Journal for Progressive Innovation and Research (GJPIR) levies a nominal article processing charge (APC) to support editorial handling, peer-review coordination, copy-editing, and digital publication services. The applicable APC generally ranges between INR 500 and INR 1,000, depending on the manuscript type and journal section.

The APC is payable at the time of manuscript submission and initiation of the evaluation process. Payment of the APC does not guarantee acceptance and does not influence editorial decisions or peer-review outcomes, which are based solely on the scholarly merit, originality, and quality of the submission. Any revisions to the fee structure will be communicated on the Journal's official website and will not apply retrospectively.

All manuscripts submitted to GJPIR will undergo an initial editorial screening. During this stage, the editorial team will verify whether the submission is within the scope of the Journal, assess its overall quality and presentation, check for compliance with the formatting and structural requirements and run a plagiarism check using reliable similarity-detection software such as Turnitin or URKUND. The Journal maintains a strict anti-plagiarism policy and normally expects the overall similarity index to be within acceptable limits as per good academic practice. Submissions with excessively high similarity may be returned to authors for revision or rejected outright

Manuscripts that pass the initial screening are sent for double-blind peer review. At least two independent reviewers with expertise in the relevant field evaluate the manuscript without knowing the identity of the authors, and the authors do not know the identity of the reviewers. Reviewers assess the manuscript on parameters such as originality, relevance, methodological soundness, clarity of presentation, coherence of arguments, quality of analysis and overall contribution to the discipline. Based on the reviewers' reports and recommendations, the editorial board will arrive at a decision, which may be acceptance, acceptance subject to minor revisions, a request for major revisions and resubmission or rejection.

In cases where revisions are requested, authors are expected to address all comments and suggestions provided by the reviewers and editors in a systematic and respectful manner. Along with the revised manuscript, authors must submit a detailed response document explaining how each point raised in the review has been addressed or, where a suggestion has not been followed, providing a clear and reasoned justification. Failure to adequately respond to reviewer feedback may result in rejection of the manuscript even at the revision stage.

Once a manuscript is accepted for publication, it will undergo copy-editing, language polishing, layout formatting and final proof preparation. Authors may be requested to review page proofs to check for typographical or minor factual errors. Substantive changes to the content at the proof stage are discouraged and will be allowed only in exceptional circumstances and with editorial approval. After final approval, the article will be scheduled for publication in an appropriate issue of the Journal, either in print, online or both, depending on the Journal's publication model.

GJPIR adheres to internationally recognised principles of publication ethics as outlined by bodies such as the Committee on Publication Ethics (COPE) and the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE). Authors are required to disclose any conflicts of interest, sources of research funding and any ethical approvals obtained for studies involving human participants, animals or sensitive data. In the event of suspected misconduct, fabrication, falsification or unethical practices, the Journal reserves the right to investigate the matter and, where necessary, retract published articles in accordance with established ethical procedures.

The Global Journal for Progressive Innovation and Research (GJPIR) reserves the right to revise, update, or modify its editorial policies, submission guidelines, and ethical standards from time to time in order to align with evolving best practices in scholarly publishing. Authors are advised to consult the most recent version of these policies available on the Journal's official website before submitting their manuscripts.
